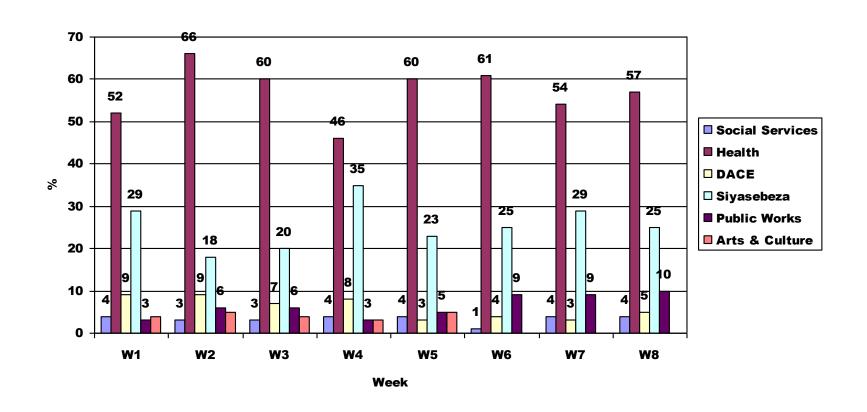
Purpose of the Report

- To provide an overview of proportion of projects sampled per client department over a period of 8 weeks
- To provide analysis to determine trends in project status over 8 weeks
- To assess whether the problems identified at the beginning of the projects have been addressed

Methodology and Approach

- Information used included analysis of weekly reports on spread sheet, and weekly reports of PMRGs
- The major source of data is the PMRG weekly reporting software between 25 January and 11 March
- Data was analyzed using SPSS statistical software
- The total number of projects sampled on a weekly basis ranged from 95 projects to 186 projects
- The information has previously been used to compile weekly reports which were submitted to the Department of Public Transport Roads and Works, Gauteng

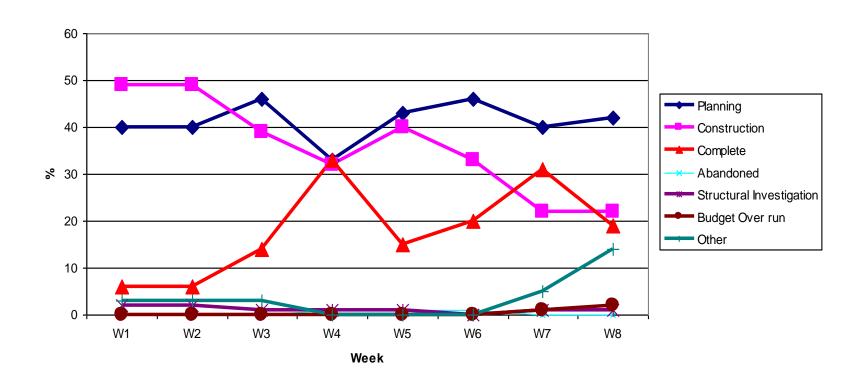
Comparing percentage of projects from Client Departments (25 Jan - 11 March 2005)



Analysis of Projects by Client Departments (25 Jan - 11 March 2005)

- Proportions of projects sampled was consisted for all the 8 weeks, with health projects commanding a majority between 46% (in week 5) to 66% (in week 3)
- The second highest proportion of sampled projects were under siyasebeza which ranged between 18% (the lowest in week 2) to 35% in week 5
- The consistency of the project sampling has further strengthened the reliability of the data collected over 8 weeks.
- The total sample for arts and culture projects ranged between 0% (in weeks 6, 7 and 8) to 5% (which was highest in week 2)
- The total sample for public works projects ranged between
 3% in week 1 which was the lowest to 10% in week 8

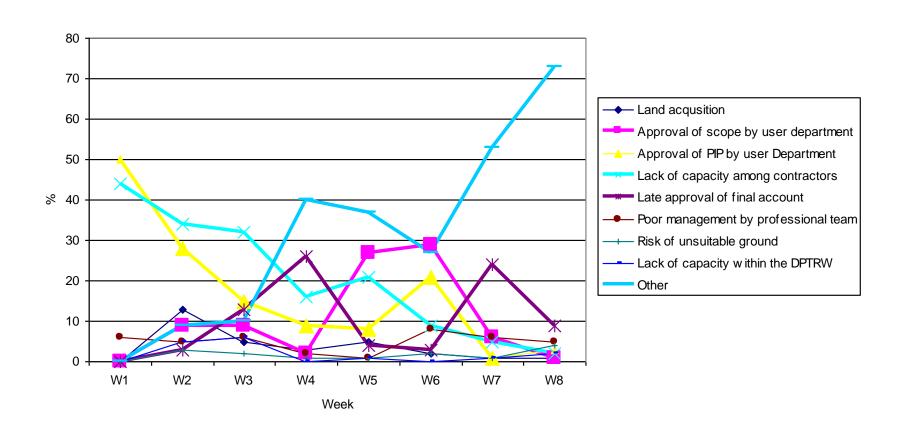
Comparing Project Status from 25 January to 11 March 2005



Analysis of Project Status, 25 January to 11 March 2005

- Over a period of 8 weeks, the proportion of projects under planning ranged from 33% (lowest in week 5) to 46% (highest in in week 6)
- Since the majority of projects were still in a planning phase, this would suggest that a significant proportion of projects be unable to spend their allocation this year.
- The proportion of projects under construction has decreased from 49% in week 1 to 22% in week 8.
- During this period, the proportion of projects being completed increased from 6% in week 1 to as high as 33% (in week 4)

Summary and Concluding Remarks

 The appointment of PMRGs appears to be yielding some significant achievements such as the facilitation of PIPs and the capacitating of contractors

 However, the appointment of fewer PMRGs will ensure proper co-ordination of PMRGs in the next financial year, and an appropriate deployment of resources

Analysis of Problems over 8 weeks, 25 January to 11 March 2005

- The four major problems experienced are: delays in the approval of PIPs, lack of capacity among contractors, and late approval of final accounts
- In terms of delays in the approval of PIPs, there has been a decrease in the number of delays from 50% to about 1% (in week 8) which suggests the success in large part to the PMRGs
- Equally, it appears that the lack of capacity on the part of contractors has steadily been addressed by PMRGs.
